

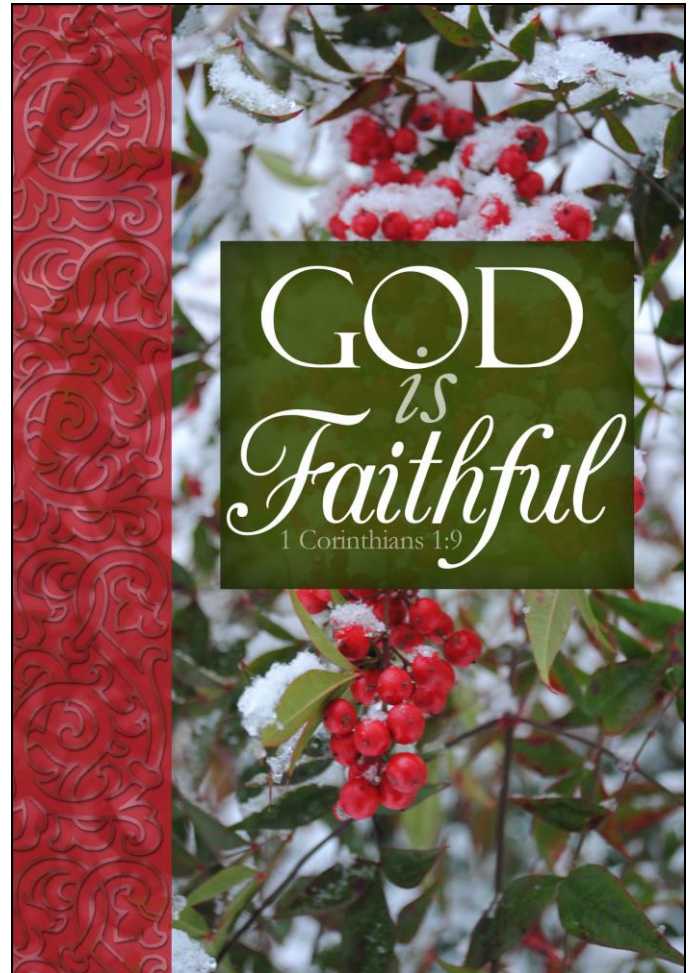
Be Alert, Get Busy, Calm Down!

The news coming out of the Middle East in the past week has certainly set most people on edge across the globe. World events of such a nature are unsettling enough, but with a Middle Eastern context and especially involving the nation, Israel, it takes on a significantly different dimension. The reasons are noteworthy. The happenings of this tinderbox of the world typically prompt talks of the end of the world, the last days, the second advent of our Lord Jesus or something on the order of the apocalyptic scenarios of the Book of Revelations, the New Testament's last book, and one almost entirely given to events leading right into eternity!

Almost immediately from its founding, the Church, the Body of Christ, has been as concerned with the end times as it has been with the spreading of the Gospel. Matthew's Gospel in Chapter 24 records one of the most explicit accountings of end-time events outside of Revelations and the Old Testament prophetic book, Daniel. As a matter of fact, much of Jesus' explanation in the chapter is heavily rooted in Daniel's prophecy of the end of the age and covering the death, resurrection, and reign of the Messiah for all eternity.

The Olivet Discourse of our Lord is a must for understanding our day and age as it details the fate and future of the world from God's determination. Israel is rightly seen as a prophetic time clock because virtually every prophecy of Scripture, one way or another, directly or indirectly involves this one tiny nation. What happens then to this nation must claim our most serious attention. Yet, God would have us not to panic or be apprehensive. Jesus tells us that God's saints have absolutely



no reason for fears and anxieties. Believers throughout the ages have been on the alert with all kinds of anticipatory bizarre attitudes, exactly what the Lord warned against. These attitudes and acting have caused much disillusionment and despair within the Body of Christ. As Christ followers our mindsets should be those of a holy alertness without the despair of fear and unfulfilled expectations.

Before His ascension to heaven, the disciples gathered around the Lord and wondered when He would restore the Kingdom to Israel, the Jewish nation. The question substantively resonated, but timewise, it was off. Jesus told them it was not for them to know the time or timing, only known to God, but their preoccupation and mission for the hour must

be the proclamation of the Good News of the Kingdom. It is the message and assignment of the church to make known the full counsels of God to the rest of the world. It is this imperative that we must primarily focus on even as we wait the return of the Son of God because the preaching of the Gospel is linked to the Kingdom of God and Jesus’ re-entry into the world.

The New Testament commands believers to adopt two attitudes concerning our Lord’s return. The first has already been expanded on, and it’s the Great Commission and its spread. Secondly, all believers strive, by God’s grace, to be as unspotted from the world as God would have us be. The Apostle John, in his first epistle, writes of the Lord’s return in Chapter 3 and tells us about the glorious prospect of seeing our Lord and being like Him! John further tells us that a life of purity and holiness ought to be our habit without reading prophetic interpretations into every global crisis.

We are ready to meet the Lord Jesus when we busy ourselves with God’s priorities of the Kingdom and leading lives of holiness and righteousness unto the Lord!

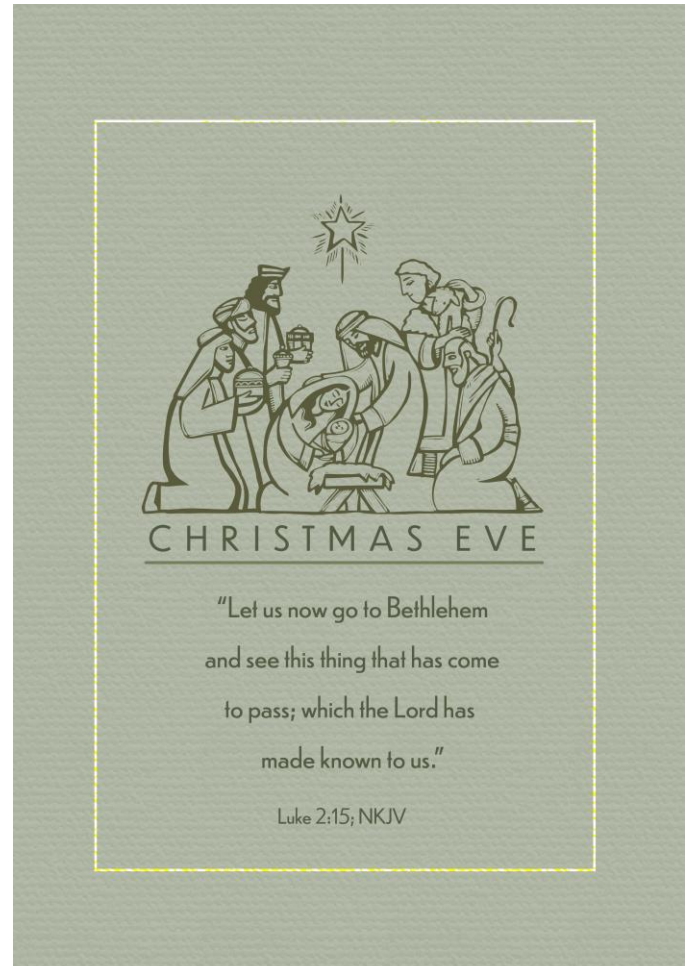

Christmas Spirit

Early December generally finds us in full anticipation mode. Christmas is coming! We purchase gifts, decorate our homes, plan special meals, and prepare for parties. 'Tis the season to be merry and bright....

And then, if and when we dare, we look at the news. Wars and rumors of wars. Displaced migrants. Human trafficking. Natural disasters: earthquakes, volcanoes erupting, hurricanes and tornadoes. Suffering of unimaginable depth and endless duration.

Christmas seems incongruous in our world today. It can feel inappropriate and even callous to celebrate Christmas in light of the suffering in today's world. But I believe that that is exactly the point of Christmas, and precisely why it is so important to celebrate.

Jesus was born more than 2000 years ago. Israel was under the rule of the Roman Empire, known for its authoritarian government which relied on brute strength and cruelty to maintain peace. It was a dark time of fear and suffering.

Madeline L'Engle writes these words as part of a poem celebrating the Incarnation:

*This is no time for a child to be born,
With the earth betrayed by war & hate....
That was no time for a child to be born
In a land in the crushing grip of Rome;*

And yet the Bible tells us that Jesus was born as God Incarnate "in the fullness of time." During a time of brutality, hardship, and suffering, the glory of God shined down from

heaven, and a host of angels celebrated in giving glory to God. God became Incarnate man and dwelt among men. Sin and suffering did not evaporate: Jesus lived and breathed in the trenches and in the wreckage caused by the fall.

And so, some 2000 years later, we mark the greatest event in human history. And by all appearances, mankind has not made much progress in the centuries between then and now. Suffering continues. Many people live in hopelessness and desperation. We are reminded, again, of our need for the Messiah.

The Messiah has come, and He is coming again! This is worth celebrating! We are called to manifest Christ, to love mercy, do justice, and walk humbly with our God. Marking the Incarnation and anticipating Christ's return represents the sure foundation upon which we can fulfill that calling. A wholehearted Christmas celebration is exactly what this world needs. May the light of Christ—and our celebration of His birth—shine in the darkness....

And just this month, I've been hearing a commercial from Dunkin' Donuts that says, "Making it to Wednesday, you deserve a reward." How absurd! We have nothing to do with the passage of days, yet Dunkin' Donuts wants you to feel that you deserve something good because it is now Wednesday. So go to Dunkin' Donuts on Wednesday and get your reward (while spending your money).

Christmas is no exception. Children are taught that if they are good, Santa will bring them presents. Remember, Santa is watching and is making a list of the naughty and the nice children. So if you want Santa to bring you presents, you need to be nice to your sister, clean your room, share your toys, etc. You are only going to get presents if you deserve them.

I am so thankful that this is not how God operates! God does not give us good things because we deserve them. If this is how He operated, not a single person would ever receive anything good from God! Romans 5:6, 8, 10 says we were as sinners, ungodly, and God's enemies. Yet God chose to give us the gift of Jesus, His precious Son. He sent Jesus to this world to be born as a human, to live

among us so that we could know God better, and to die for our sins. Why, if we were God's enemies, did God give us the gift of Jesus?
