The Guiding Star



One of the things I enjoy doing is to look up to the clear night sky and gaze at the stars. It brings back memories from my childhood when my brother and I used to go up on our rooftop terrace and look at the beautiful night sky. Elders' Corner

Over the past twenty months, I've written in these pages about **trust** (March 2024), **hope** (November 2024), and **courage** (April 2025). My most recent article (July 2025) celebrated the hiring of Pastor Jame and reminded us of our Biblical call to use our gifts to fulfill God's purposes in our church and community.

Those first three messages were written to encourage us during a season of trials without a pastor. The last was a bookend, a call to prepare for the work ahead. Now, as we turn a new page in our church's history and at the time of this writing, approaching Thanksgiving, I find myself humbled and deeply thankful for all that God has done during this time. This article is about **gratitude**—because nothing is too small to notice and give thanks for.

In Psalm 100:4 we read: "Enter into His gates with thanksgiving, and into His courts with praise. Be thankful to Him and bless His name."

For those that don't know, the Elder Board meets weekly on Tuesday evenings. Each meeting begins and ends with prayer. Since becoming an Elder, I've noticed my prayers often start with thanksgiving. I love focusing on the smallest and simplest things. It fills me with joy to reflect and give thanks. Here are just a few examples: the beating of our hearts, the wonder of our seeing eyes, the air in our lungs, the hearing of our ears, the blueness of the sky, the leaves blown across the green grass, the warmth of our bed, the ability of our mind to think and create, the spouse we love, the kids we adore, the time to relax, the ability to work, the church body, and the small miracles we celebrate.

Psychological research confirms what Scripture has long taught: gratitude focuses

our attention on the present. It helps us avoid dwelling on past hurts or worrying about future uncertainties. In fact, it's nearly impossible to be truly grateful and deeply despondent at the same time. Those emotions are mutually exclusive. The Apostle Paul understood this truth long before modern psychology. In 1 Thessalonians 5:18 he writes: "In everything give thanks for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." Notice Paul says in everything—not because everything is good, but because in all circumstances we can trust God's sovereignty and goodness.

It's not easy to be thankful when you've had a bad day or hard news. Sometimes it's a hundred little frustrations over the course of a day or week that push us into disillusionment, despair, or even anger. In these moments, I challenge you (and myself) to take those moments to start small:

- "I'm thankful to even be aware of this situation."
- "I'm thankful to have a chance to think about being thankful."
- "I'm thankful a solution might exist, even if I don't see it yet."

As we gather with family and friends during the Advent season, let's resist an easy tendency to overlook God's goodness in our lives. Begin by thanking Him for the "small things" before moving on to "bigger things." Paul reminds us in Philippians 4:6: "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God." So, when the holiday glow fades and everyday challenges return, hold fast to your gratitude. Give thanks and remember – you are blessed. Rejoice knowing that God is at the helm, fully in control, and His goodness surrounds you.

Elizabeth MacQueen's Mission Trip to Peru

As promised during the Worship Service on November 9, we're excited to share additional information about a wonderful mission trip opportunity for Elizabeth MacQueen. Please take a moment to read her message below and pray for her upcoming trip to Peru:

This January, I have the opportunity to travel to Peru for 10 days on a mission trip with other high school seniors at The Wilberforce School. We will partner with a local church in Iquitos, Peru and travel upriver to minister among jungle villages. The church has been laboring in the region for 40+ years, planting new churches, training and teaching leaders, and providing material support (e.g., clean-water wells).

While the people of coastal Peru are familiar with Christianity, the message of the Gospel has only been known in the remote jungle regions for the last 100 years or so. The mission trip I will be going on involves house to house evangelism and prayer, leading Vacation Bible School, sports ministry with the local children, and participating in church services.

As you can imagine, a trip like this requires support. First, I ask that you pray. Second, I ask that you consider giving financially. In order to go on this mission trip, I need to raise \$2750 by December 17, 2025. This trip is a great opportunity for me to follow Christ's call to serve the church and his command in Matthew 28 to "go and make disciples of all nations." Inviting dialogue to encourage growth in and among us

Prepare the Way of the Lord!

December is a month of anticipation: Christmas is coming! Our celebration of the earthly arrival of God Incarnate is rapidly approaching, and with it a significant "TO DO" list. We send cards, shop for and purchase gifts, decorate our homes, bake goodies, and plan for guests and parties. These may all serve a good purpose, but it strikes me that the most important preparation is that of our own hearts.... It is what the liturgical season of Advent—Coming—is all about.

John the Baptist was the forerunner of Christ, called to proclaim the kingdom of God. In the Gospel of Matthew, we read these words of John:

Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.

Make ready the way of the LORD,

Make His paths straight!

The trappings of Christmas are not necessarily inappropriate, but we do not want them to become a trap! They are secondary to John's message. If we are to recognize and welcome Christ into the depths of our beings, and if we are to embrace His work in us and through us, it is important to turn our minds and hearts to the Kingdom of God. We can prayerfully identify and repent of sin, and we can look to remove the life clutter that could make it difficult for the Lord to reach us. In doing so, we become more able to receive our Lord and respond to His indwelling work in us via the Holy Spirit.

John also proclaimed the importance of bearing fruit in keeping with repentance (Luke

3:8). Genuine repentance means that again by the power of the Holy Spirit, we change direction from self-focus to God-focus and become more closely aligned with Christ. When we do this in the here and now, we are better able to manifest Christ. Our lives echo John's words to the world, that the kingdom of God has come!

And now if we circle back to our Christmas "TO DO" lists, it is easy to see that the trappings of our celebration will have deeper meaning and impact if we see those trappings not merely as something we traditionally do, but as expressions of the kingdom of God within us and pouring forth. Joy to the World! Prepare the Way of the Lord!
